



Turnitin






The past year has been an important one for Turnitin and plagiarism detection software due to the appearance of ChatGPT and other Generative AI applications in late 2022. Turnitin developed an AI detection tool which became available to NCI faculty on 4th April 2023. NCI also began using Turnitin's Draft Coach in late 2022, a tool which can be used by students to check their work while in Word Online or Google Docs.

In January 2024, NCI upgraded from Turnitin Feedback Studio to TFS with Originality. This allows for continued access to the AI detection tool in addition to Authorship, which uses forensic linguistics to track the authorship of written work. An Enhanced Similarity Report has also become available to NCI faculty.

NCI Learning Teaching and Assessment Subcommittees released a college-wide policy on the use of ChatGPT and other tools like it in September 2023, along with an updated project cover sheet which includes an AI declaration (links to these below). AI use is not explicitly forbidden as part of this policy but may be permitted in certain assessments as long as evidence is provided of appropriate AI use.

QQI White Paper on Academic Integrity






QQI has launched a White Paper on Academic Integrity and is looking for feedback. All responses to this paper on behalf of NCI would be welcomed.

A legislative amendment introduced through the Qualifications and Quality Assurance (Education and Training) (Amendment) Act 2019 created new offences related to the facilitation of cheating, the advertisement of cheating services, and the publication of such advertisements. QQI is identified as prosecutor of these offences. The white paper sets out QQI's intended approach to implementing the new legislative provision (section 43A).

Academic Writing

Using evidence to back up your opinion is one of the main characteristics of academic writing.

You will need to always support your writing with evidence from good quality sources and reference these writers.

When approaching academic writing at NCI, it is essential to have an understanding of plagiarism and referencing so that you can uphold your academic integrity in your written work.







The act of taking another person's words, ideas, data or images and using them as your own without giving credit to the original source of the information.





Examples of Plagiarism





What causes plagiarism?

- · Poor time management
- Not understanding plagiarism
- Problems with note taking
- Deliberately copying words/code from other sources without credit
- Insufficiently paraphrasing words taken from other sources
- Inaccurate referencing
- Lack of confidence in English language skills
- · Following practices encouraged or accepted in previous educational experience and that are not accepted at NCI





How do you avoid plagiarism?

- Don't copy and paste text this will inevitably lead to using wording that is too close to the original
- Use a variety of good quality sources
 Keep good quality and accurate notes write down details of the source you have taken information from and where you can find it again
- Make sure that you paraphrase properly, put quotation marks around exact wording for direct quotes and reference correctly
- Paraphrase at the information gathering stage

What is referencing?

Referencing is used in academic writing to identify where you have used material written or produced by others.

It can be called **citing** or **referencing**.

It is important to be consistent and accurate in your references to enable readers to identify and locate the material to which you have referred to.







- Reference at the exact point in your writing where you are using the information from a source (direct quote or paraphrase), using a short, basic reference as formatted in the required referencing style
- Include a list of references at the end of your work which requires the full details of the sources used and are formatted in the required <u>referencing style</u>



Academic Integrity & A.I.

A.l. or artificial intelligence (Al) tools that use natural language processing techniques to respond to user-generated prompts, such as ChatGPT/BARD/Copilot (ask a question & the tool gives you an answer).

"Al brings both opportunities and challenges in the context of academic integrity. While it can assist in identifying and preventing dishonest behaviors, its use also raises ethical questions, especially when it comes to privacy and surveillance. Moreover, it is important to remember that Al tools can support, but not replace, the work of teachers and administrators in promoting academic integrity. Ensuring honesty in academic work also relies heavily on creating a culture of integrity and setting clear expectations for ethical behavior."

Library Resources

At NCI, particularly in postgraduate courses, you will be expected to use good quality academic resources in your written work.

The quickest and easiest way to find these sources is via the library.

As an NCI student, you have access to online academic resources that are not freely available on the internet.

Internet Sources

Don't depend on internet sources, use them to add context, but do not build your work on them.

Be very selective with webpages - no date? no author? a lot of pop up adds? - likely not a good source to use













🗖 turnitin & Draft Coach

Turnitin is NCI's plagiarism detection software.

Each assignment you submit on Moodle will be submitted on Turnitin and you will receive a similarity report.

You can use Turnitin's Draft Coach software to check the similarity of your written work before you submit it on Moodle.



Accessing Draft Coach

Go to the Current Students Hub > Select Office 365 myApps > Open MS Word or Google Workspace

At the top of your document you will have the option for Turnitin which will open Draft Coach.



Similarity Report

Having similarities does in your work does not mean you have committed plagiarism. Your instructor will review the similarities and determine their nature.

Turnitin does not determine whether you have quoted or cited correctly, it only points out similarities of any kind.


- Direct quotes that you have cited properly may be




Winner of the National College of Ireland's 2023 President's Award for Excellence in Education

Open Access and NCI agreements



Open Access (or Transformative) Agreements allow NCI and the library to negotiate with publishers for access to periodicals, journals, conference proceedings, and databases. With this access, NCI-affiliated authors are not required to pay additional charges for publication, and staff and students may read works published by these sources.

The Association for Computing Machinery is the world's largest computing society, and the ACM Digital Library is a database of literature and bibliographic resources comprising of journals, magazines, and proceedings aimed at professionals in the ICT sector, with more than 600,000 full-text articles.

NCI has reached an OA agreement with ACM whereby, having paid an annual fee, NCI-affiliated literature will be published at no additional cost to the author as part of the new ACM OPEN model, and staff and students have unlimited access to the ACM Digital Library. NCI-affiliated publications will additionally be added to NORMA¹¹, NCI's Institutional Repository, and will be given a Creative Commons licence; more on this here¹².

This agreement represents a fantastic opportunity for NCI staff and students and we would highly encourage you to take advantage of this by perusing ACM offerings¹³ and perhaps contributing some of your own work¹⁴.



Staff News






Our brilliant Mathematics Development and Support Officer, Jonathan Lambert, recently successfully defended his PhD in Maynooth University. The title of Jonathan's thesis is, "Beyond Execution Speed: Understanding the Power and Energy Consumption Dynamics of the Java Runtime Environment and its associated Virtual Machine", and more information can be found below. This is of course an incredible achievement. **Congratulations, Dr Lambert!**

Jonathan's PhD focused on modelling the power and energy consumption characteristics of the Java Runtime Environment and its associated Virtual Machine, a managed runtime system targeted by numerous programming languages. Jonathan's research findings have implications across a wide range of managed runtime systems, whether deployed on embedded systems, mobile devices, sensor nodes, large-scale systems or data centres. From a high level, his findings indicate that there exist classes of applications that have significantly more favourable power consumption characteristics when interpreted compared to when they are executed by state-of-the-art just-in-time compilers, a significant finding supporting power-capping strategies within data centres, and highlighting the application cases that would benefit from such a strategy. In addition, Jonathan's work has presented a framework for future systems performance analysis that moves beyond the single snapshot measurement methodology predominately relied upon within the field of Computer Science.





Our Industrial Relations Collection




